WILDERNESS WILDLIFE WEEK CRITIQUES:

Since their program, "The Art of Photography: An Image Critique for Artistic Enhancement," was a hit last year at **Wilderness Wildlife Week**, Pat Gordy (PSA Region Director, Photographic Society of Chattanooga) and Ron Plasencia (of Morristown's Photographic Society of East Tennessee) will critique images again, but this year, they will have two sessions – Saturday and Sunday.

If you wish to have images critiqued in the session by Pat and Ron, **send up to three images of totally different content before the **December 15** deadline to wwwcritique@gmail.com. Images should be resized for projection and consistency to a maximum image width for horizontals of 1024 pixels, and a maximum image height for verticals of 768 pixels. Anything smaller is difficult to see enough to critique.**

Participants are not required to attend the session to submit images, and attendees are not required to submit images. **Submitted images will be presented in a slide show format. Images may be modified during critique to illustrate the presenter's perspective. The second session will present images not shown in the earlier session. As time allows, selected images from the earlier session may be re-shown. Those wishing to have a written critique should request this when emailing their images. FIELD LEARNING EVENT WILDLIFE IN CADES COVE

Meeting place: Parking area at the entrance to the Cades Cove loop road

Time: 7:00 AM

Location description: Cades Cove is the premier location for whitetail deer in late autumn. The rutting season is still underway, and there is excellent potential for photographing large bucks in their prime. Beautiful animals in a beautiful setting like Cades Cove are the makings of great photographs.

Landscape and scenic shots may be an exciting possibility, also. The roadways, fence lines, and isolated trees in Cades Cove make excellent compositional elements. A heavy frost or a little snow can transform the cove into a wonderland for photography.

Learning opportunities:

- How to respect wildlife while making photographs
- How to choose lenses and camera settings for wildlife photographs
- How to get the best lighting on your animal subject
- How to use your tripod or other camera support when animals are moving about
- How to get better shots by anticipating animal movements

Lenses in the medium to long telephoto range will be most useful for wildlife shots. Lenses of all focal lengths might be useful for landscapes and scenics. Frosty conditions offer good macro opportunities.

On a cold day, your camera and tripod can freeze your hands and make you miserable. Chemical hand warmers (e.g., HotHands) can turn the misery into fun again. Don't leave home without them.

Very little walking will be required for this trip. Most of the shooting will probably be near the road. Heavy dew or frost can soak your boots very quickly, so water-friendly footwear is recommended. An extra pair of dry shoes and socks in the car might be helpful.

Driving directions: From Maryville, take U.S. Hwy 321 (Lamar Alexander Parkway) to Townsend. At the Townsend traffic light, continue straight ahead into the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. At the "Y" in the road, take the right fork to Cades Cove. Drive to the parking area near the gate at the entrance to the Cades Cove loop road.

NOTE: This should be one of the best times of the year to photograph the Cove and the wildlife. The animals are active and the temps being cool to cold get them very active. Larry

Get an inexpensive frame from Walmart or JoAnn's and drop your print into the frame and then offer it for sale to the homeowner for say \$20 framed. You may be surprised at how many you can sell. The secret is to get a bunch of homes fairly close by to save time and money in the marketing.

(4) SPECIAL NOTES:

Ideas for Christmas gifts for photographers:

Instead of getting a macro lens, why get a set of lens extension tubes such as those made by Kenko for your camera. These simply are hollow lens couplers that get your lens off the body of the camera and allow you to use existing lens to get very close to your subject. They work better with fixed lens rather than the zooms but they still work with the zooms although you have to be a little more stable. (about \$100).

How about the little plastic white balance hair cap looking thingy that simply goes over your lens to set your white balance. (About \$30) Lally cap--- (www.lallyphotography.com/store.)

Larger Compact Flash and memory cards. Price has come down on the 16 GB cards.

What about having your best family image made into a poster. (locally made by Charles Reeves at 966-5768).

Check out the cards by Photographers edge to be used year round with your own images (*for those of you using Nikons...pitures for everyone else!!! Just could resiste. Larry*) (www.photographersedge.com).
